Global Learning

Global Learning is one of our school's core threads. It provides children with the opportunity to explore the world around them through the eyes of another community.

As a school, we are lucky to have a strong partnership with a school in Nepal, called East Horizon. Throughout this year, many of our children have participated in projects with the students in Nepal which we want to share with you.



In the Spring term, the Year 5 children completed their project, which was called, 'Culture in a Box'. It provided the children with the opportunity to explore what culture and identity means to them and to other people. The children created a box and filled it with items that expressed who they are as a person. Once they were made, we exchanged photos of our boxes with Nepal. This provided the children with

the opportunity to discuss similarities and differences between their cultures and traditions. A few children across the year group even got to attend a skype call to talk about their boxes with some of the students in Nepal! The children clearly articulated their ideas and we hope they enjoyed the session. Well done to all of the children in Year 5 who participated in the project, your boxes were incredible!

Towards the end of the Spring term, our Year 2, Reception and Nursery children began to work on their project with Nepal, which was called, 'A Day in the Life Vlog'. They worked extremely hard to make a year group video to explain what their day as a pupil is like here at CVPS. A few







weeks into the Summer term, we exchanged videos with Nepal. The children thoroughly enjoyed watching these and gained a huge insight into what a traditional school day consists of in Nepal. To share their feedback and to ask some questions, the children wrote postcards to the students. We received postcards back, which we found to be very exciting!

During the Summer term, Year 4 had the opportunity to create a video to demonstrate how CVPS is trying to tackle climate change. The children clearly articulated our initiates to the students in Nepal and they even found examples of what we do at our school, which greatly supported their explanations. Our video has been shared with the students in Nepal and we are eagerly awaiting to see theirs, so we can make comparisons and suggest what each school could do to continue to tackle climate change.

Global Scholars – Boston Calling!

At the end of June, our very own Mrs Cherot was invited to Boston to participate in the launch of the Global Competency Codebook, which has been developed by Global Cities and the Harvard Graduate School of Education. As part of her work with Global Scholars, Mrs Cherot spoke on the educator panel at the launch event, sharing her insights in teaching Global Competencies at a primary school level. She was joined on the panel by educators from Canada, USA and Poland, who each brought their unique perspective and experiences of using the Codebook to teach and assess Global Competencies such as appreciation for dive

and assess Global Competencies such as appreciation for diversity, cultural understanding, global knowledge and global engagement. Mrs Cherot was also interviewed for videos, discussing the value of the Codebook as a learning tool, that will be shared with educators across the world later this year.

Global Scholars continues to be a successful part of the Year 5 curriculum at CVPS and we are delighted to continue to work on this international digital exchange programme in September. For our current Year 5 pupils this year, the theme was 'World of Water'. They have created videos, guide books, surveys, infographics and news reports, sharing them with their international peers in the e-classroom. Our Year 5 pupils have communicated with children from across the globe, including Poland, USA, China, Kazakhstan, Japan, Spain to name a few! Next year, the theme is 'Nature in our Cities' and we look forward to sharing the digital projects and learning the children do throughout Year 5.

Gardening Club

The Gardening club would like to thank everyone who bought plants or made donations for produce at the Summer Fair and on the stall by the office this term. We have raised over £300 to be spent in the allotment area next year.

The Gardening club this year has "bloomed". The children have grown a wide range of vegetables and have successfully tended the new fruit cage, where our first blueberries, currants and raspberries are ripening.

This weekend we entered the Chipstead Flower Show and won prizes for our rhubarb, marrow, lavender and plate of 3 vegetables.

David entertained the children (and staff) with his stories and the importance of editing in the writing process. The children had the opportunity to ask David questions and enjoyed learning more about being an author. He read some extracts from his books and signed copies to those pupils who had ordered some of his stories.



Reception

As we finish the year, Reception has had a busy summer term! Our topic has been 'Wonderful World' and we have enjoyed learning about the flags, languages, food, animals and culture of the seven different continents of the world. We have read lots of stories linked to these continents such as Handa's Surprise, We're Roaming in the Rainforest, Namaste Mumbai and The Koala who Could and have enjoyed retelling these stories with puppets and drawing out story maps. As part of our learning about Europe, we went on our school trip to Bockett's Farm and had lots of fun visiting lots of animals including pigs, sheep, cows, goats, horses and donkeys! We also enjoyed going on a tractor ride to see the animals in the field, visiting the bigger animals and having a small animal session where we could stroke guinea pigs, rabbits and chickens. To finish our day, we loved exploring the outdoor playgrounds and watching the pig race where the purple pig won!

Over the past few weeks we have been preparing the children for their upcoming transition to Year One by having lots of discussions and circle time around questions or worries they have. We then had a couple of visitors from Year One classes who shared their experiences and the children were given the opportunity to ask them questions. They had great questions like 'Do they do Science?' and 'How did you feel when you went into Year One?' and the visitors answered these brilliantly. As part of our writing, the children reflected on this year and have been thinking about all the things they have achieved like being able to write their name, read sentences or count up to 20 and beyond. They have also written about all the things they are looking forward to in Year One, like having playtime on the field and having music lessons with Mr Vinten! We have had a fantastic year together and are so proud of the progress the children have made! We wish them all the best for Year One and hope that everyone has a lovely summer holiday!

Treehouse

The children in Treehouse Class have really enjoyed the 'Paws, Roars and Whiskers' topic this half term! They really enjoyed exploring the text 'Monkey Puzzle' and learning the Makaton for the different animals. The children were enthusiastic when they received a 'Help, I've lost my Monkey' letter from Monkey's Mum and all engaged in mark making or writing to write their own letter in reply. The children also really enjoyed the very humorous 'Farmer Duck'. They learnt lots of Makaton and names for the animals and many were able to join in with the repeating phrases in the book. On numerous occasions the children engaged in role play and it was very funny to watch them pretending to be the 'lazy Farmer' being chased out of the farm by the animals! In Science this term Treehouse Class have been learning about plants. They have planted their own Sunflowers and watched these grow – comparing the different heights of the plants and communicating what the plants need to thrive. Some of the children have learnt the names for different parts of a plant and many of the class learned the Makaton for flower and Sunflower. We hope to send lots of Sunflowers home (and we are sure you will really like the children's own hand painted pots!)

In Art this half term the pupils responded to the piece 'Tiger in a Tropical Storm'. The children were enthusiastic to paint their own backgrounds after looking at the art work in detail. They then enjoyed collecting and using natural materials to add to the background and painting their own tigers to go on top. As always, the children have been encouraged to give their own opinions on this famous art work, communicate what they can see and then respond to the piece using different materials and processes. It is wonderful to see the children working hard at their art and thinking carefully about the piece they have been shown. Treehouse Class have continued to work hard during their Maths lessons this half term. Some of the children have worked hard to explore different quantities and to use the Makaton for 'more' and 'lots' during their play or structured tasks. Many of the children have made huge progress in their counting and using the language and knowledge to calculate 1 more or 1 less in practical problems. A few of the children have been very interested in learning their number bonds to 10 or 100 and also learning to count in 2s and 10s and apply this to number problems. Super work Treehouse Class!

Year 2



During our science lessons, we started a new topic on plants. We carried out an experiment

to find the best conditions for our watercress to grow. We discovered that the plants need both sunlight and water to grow healthily! The children really enjoyed taking care of their own plants by watering them regularly and they made daily comparisons!

Key Stage 2 Update

Year 3

Summer 2 has absolutely flown by!

This half term, we took a trip back in time to the Viking ages for a day. We learnt all about what life was like, the armour and weapons they used and the games they played to entertain themselves. The children thoroughly enjoyed themselves and loved designing their own shields and book marks, using Viking runes (Viking alphabet).

In English, we have been studying the poem 'Beowulf'. The children have really enjoyed the mythical aspect of Viking legend and the creatures involved. They have been extremely innovative this term by creating their own mythical creatures and constructing their own free verse poetry, based around these creatures.









In Maths, we have been looking at geometry and mass. We have been building on our prior knowledge of shape to help us understand the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, along with attempting to build these shapes. We did some practical tasks together, learning about quarter, half, three-quarter and full turns. This half term, we also conducted a problem-solving investigation on

volume and capacity where the children had to identify patterns to help them create different volumes of liquid.

We have also looked at mapwork in our Geography field work. We have created sketch maps of the school to help identify the safest routes in the event of a fire. We also used an overhead map of the school grounds to help us conduct a treasure hunt throughout the school grounds, which we all found very exciting.

We hope the children have loved Year 3 and that they enjoy their well-earned summer break!

Year 4



To kick start the last half term of the academic year, we took part in sports day. Even though it was a hot summers day, the children eagerly took part in all of the carousel activities, the races and tug of war. We were so impressed by their cooperation and agility skills!

A week after sports day, we had our Year 4 assembly. The children worked incredibly hard to learn their lines in a short space of time. We were so proud of them for having the courage to clearly project their voices for all the parents and carers to hear. It was a fantastic opportunity for the children to showcase all the hard work that they have put into their Eco Heroes learning!

In maths, the children have been consolidating their understanding of time, where they have had to turn 12-hour clocks into 24-hour. Although this was a tricky concept for some, the children never gave up and have developed an excellent understanding. Once this topic was complete, we began to turn our attention towards statistics. The children explored different types of graphs including pictograms, line graphs and bar graphs. The children can now effectively interpret different graphs using the data provided. To show their understanding, they drew their own line graphs using a key! Towards the end of the summer term, we have been looking at geometry where we have discussed angles, different types of triangles and polygons.

On the last week of the first summer term, the children had the pleasure of sowing Wildflower seeds with Mrs Rogers. To showcase their understanding of this process, they wrote clear and formal instructions during their English lessons at the beginning of this term. We were very proud of them for using technical language, adverbs of time and imperative verbs to make their instructions clear for the reader to follow. After this, the children turned their attention towards poetry writing. For this poetry unit, we looked in depth at riddles. The children loved the challenge of working out different riddles! In order to write our own, we looked around our school grounds for inspiration of interesting nouns and clues that could be used to describe them. Once the children had written their own riddles, we shared them and tried to work out each other's riddles, which we all thoroughly enjoyed!



In the middle of this half term, we had the pleasure of celebrating Neurodiversity Week, where we discussed what it means to be neurodivergent. The children produced some excellent fact files for homework, which they enthusiastically shared with their peers in class. We also looked into an artist who is neurodivergent called Stephen, who is able to draw landscapes, in detail, from memory. In class, we had the opportunity to memorise a picture and draw it ourselves from memory, which we found rather tricky! The children went into the creativity suite and did some amazing watercolour artwork of the human brain. They also used patterns and shading to create a piece of artwork that represented the connections and functions of a brain. We were wowed by their stunning creations!

The week after this, we were delighted to have an author called David Fuller, who is also neurodivergent, come to visit us. He gave us an excellent insight into what it was like growing up with dyspraxia. He gave us some really useful tips on how important it is to plan a story and to edit our writing. We thoroughly enjoyed listening to some extracts from his books.

As part of our geography learning, we took part in a fieldwork project, where we compared different maps of our school and grounds. The day began with exploring our grounds and trying to draw our own maps of the school. After this, we explored an aerial view, a street view and a google maps view of our school and groups. We annotated these to show what could be seen of our school from different maps and we compared how useful each map was. We were very impressed with the children's comparison skills and the way they effectively communicated their thoughts and opinions.

It has been a pleasure to teach the children of Year 4 this academic year, they have remained enthusiastic and resilient. We also wanted a say a massive thank you to all of the parents and carers for your support with the children this year. We hope you all have a fantastic and restful summer break and we look forward to seeing you as well as the children, around the school, when we return in September!
